An act to amend Sections 2001, 2020, 2569, 3010.5, and 3014.6 of the Business and Professions Code, relating to healing arts.

LEGISLATIVE COUNSEL'S DIGEST

SB 304, as introduced, Price. Healing arts: boards.

Existing law provides for the licensure and regulation of various healing arts licensees by various boards, as defined, within the Department of Consumer Affairs, including the Medical Board of California. Existing law requires the Governor to appoint members to the board, as provided. Existing law authorizes the board to employ an executive director. Existing law provides that those provisions will be repealed on January 1, 2014. Under existing law, the board is subject to evaluation by the Joint Sunset Review Committee.

This bill would instead repeal those provisions on January 1, 2018, and subject the board to review by the appropriate policy committees of the Legislature.

Existing law provides for the regulation of registered dispensing opticians by the Medical Board of California and requires that the powers and duties of the board in that regard be subject to review by the Joint Sunset Review Committee as if those provisions were scheduled to be repealed on January 1, 2014.

This bill would instead make the powers and duties of the board subject to review by the appropriate policy committees of the Legislature as if those provisions were scheduled to be repealed on January 1, 2018.

Existing law provides for the licensure and regulation of optometrists by the State Board of Optometry. Existing law requires that the board consist of specified members and authorizes the board to appoint an

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executive officer. Existing law repeals those provisions on January 1, 2014 and subjects the board to review by the Joint Sunset Review Committee.

This bill would instead repeal those provisions on January 1, 2018, and require that the board be subject to review by the appropriate policy committees of the Legislature.

The people of the State of California do enact as follows:

- 1 SECTION 1. Section 2001 of the Business and Professions 2 Code is amended to read:
- 3 2001. (a) There is in the Department of Consumer Affairs a 4 Medical Board of California that consists of 15 members, seven of whom shall be public members.
 - (b) The Governor shall appoint 13 members to the board, subject to confirmation by the Senate, five of whom shall be public members. The Senate Committee on Rules and the Speaker of the Assembly shall each appoint a public member.
- 10 (c) Notwithstanding any other provision of law, to reduce the membership of the board to 15, the following shall occur:
 - (1) Two positions on the board that are public members having a term that expires on June 1, 2010, shall terminate instead on January 1, 2008.
 - (2) Two positions on the board that are not public members having a term that expires on June 1, 2008, shall terminate instead on August 1, 2008.
 - (3) Two positions on the board that are not public members having a term that expires on June 1, 2011, shall terminate instead on January 1, 2008.

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SEC. 2. Section 2020 of the Business and Professions Code is amended to read:

- 2020. (a) The board may employ an executive director exempt from the provisions of the Civil Service Act and may also employ investigators, legal counsel, medical consultants, and other assistance as it may deem necessary to carry this chapter into effect. The board may fix the compensation to be paid for services subject to the provisions of applicable state laws and regulations and may incur other expenses as it may deem necessary. Investigators employed by the board shall be provided special training in investigating medical practice activities.
- (b) The Attorney General shall act as legal counsel for the board for any judicial and administrative proceedings and his or her services shall be a charge against it.
- (c) This section shall remain in effect only until January 1, 2014, 2018, and as of that date is repealed, unless a later enacted statute, that is enacted before January 1, 2014, 2018, deletes or extends that date.
- SEC. 3. Section 2569 of the Business and Professions Code is amended to read:
- 2569. The Notwithstanding any other law, the powers and duties of the board, as set forth in this chapter, shall be subject to the review required by Division 1.2 (commencing with Section 473). review by the appropriate policy committees of the Legislature. The review shall be performed as if this chapter were scheduled to be repealed as of January 1, 2014, as described in Section 473.1. 2018.
- SEC. 4. Section 3010.5 of the Business and Professions Code is amended to read:
- 3010.5. (a) There is in the Department of Consumer Affairs a State Board of Optometry in which the enforcement of this chapter is vested. The board consists of 11 members, five of whom shall be public members.
 - Six members of the board shall constitute a quorum.
- 35 (b) The board shall, with respect to conducting investigations, 36 inquiries, and disciplinary actions and proceedings, have the 37 authority previously vested in the board as created pursuant to 38 Section 3010. The board may enforce any disciplinary actions 39 undertaken by that board.

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 (c) This section shall remain in effect only until January 1, 2014, 2018, and as of that date is repealed, unless a later enacted statute, that is enacted before January 1, 2014, 2018, deletes or extends that date. The Notwithstanding any other law, the repeal of this section renders the board subject to the review required by Division 1.2 (commencing with Section 473). review by the appropriate policy committees of the Legislature.

- SEC. 5. Section 3014.6 of the Business and Professions Code is amended to read:
- 3014.6. (a) The board may appoint a person exempt from civil service who shall be designated as an executive officer and who shall exercise the powers and perform the duties delegated by the board and vested in him or her by this chapter.
- (b) This section shall remain in effect only until January 1, 2014, 2018, and as of that date is repealed, unless a later enacted statute, that is enacted before January 1, 2014, 2018, deletes or extends that date.
