## A BILL TO BE ENTITLED AN ACT

1 To amend Code Section 31-12-3.2 of the Official Code of Georgia Annotated, relating to 2 meningococcal disease vaccinations and disclosures, so as to revise provisions regarding 3 vaccination against meningococcal disease of college students; to amend Article 2 of Chapter 4 34 of Title 43 of the Official Code of Georgia Annotated, relating to physicians, so as to 5 authorize the administration of vaccines by pharmacists or nurses pursuant to vaccine protocol agreements with physicians; to provide for definitions; to provide requirements for 6 7 the content of vaccine protocol agreements; to provide that a party to a vaccine protocol agreement shall not delegate his or her authority; to limit the number of vaccine protocol 8 9 agreements into which a physician may enter at any one time; to prohibit certain entities from 10 entering into vaccine protocol agreements; to provide for rules and regulations; to provide for limited liability; to provide for applicability; to provide for statutory construction; to 11 12 provide for related matters; to repeal conflicting laws; and for other purposes.

13 BE IT ENACTED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF GEORGIA:

SECTION 1.
Code Section 31-12-3.2 of the Official Code of Georgia Annotated, relating to
meningococcal disease vaccinations and disclosures, is amended by revising subsection (b)
as follows:

"(b) <u>In accordance with the recommendations of the Advisory Committee on Immunization</u> 18 Practices of the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, newly admitted students 19 Students who are 18 years of age or older residing in campus housing as defined by the 20 21 postsecondary educational institution or residing in sorority or fraternity houses shall be 22 required to sign a document provided by the postsecondary educational institution stating that he or she has received a vaccination against meningococcal disease not more than five 23 24 years prior to such admittance or reviewed the information provided as required by 25 subsection (a) of this Code section. If a student is a minor, only a parent or guardian may sign such document." 26

15 HB 504/AP 27 **SECTION 2.** 28 Article 2 of Chapter 34 of Title 43 of the Official Code of Georgia Annotated, relating to 29 physicians, is amended by revising Code Section 43-34-26.1, relating to influenza vaccine 30 protocol agreements, as follows: "43-34-26.1. 31 32 (a) As used in this Code section, the term: 33 (1) 'Administer' means the provision of a unit dose of influenza vaccine by a pharmacist 34 or nurse pursuant to an influenza a vaccine order contained in an influenza a vaccine 35 protocol agreement with a physician. 36 (2) 'Adverse event' means an event that is a negative consequence of the administration 37 of influenza vaccine by a pharmacist or nurse that results in an unintended reaction, 38 injury, or illness, which may or may not have been preventable. 39 (3) 'Board' means the Georgia Composite Medical Board. 40 (4) 'Nurse' means a registered professional nurse as defined in paragraph (9) of Code 41 Section 43-26-3. The term shall also mean a licensed practical nurse as defined in 42 paragraph (5) of Code Section 43-26-32 who is regularly employed by a physician 43 engaged in the active practice of medicine. 44 (5) 'Pharmacist' means an individual licensed under Chapter 4 of Title 26 to engage in 45 the practice of pharmacy in the State of Georgia. (6) 'Pharmacy intern' means a pharmacy intern as defined in paragraph (19) of Code 46 47 Section 26-4-5. 48 (7) 'Physician' means an individual licensed to practice medicine and surgery pursuant 49 to this article and whose principal place of practice is located in this state. 50 (4)(8) 'Vaccine' 'Influenza vaccine' means an inactivated virus administered by injection 51 or a live attenuated virus administered by nasal spray that is prepared for the applicable 52 season and that is administered to produce or increase a specially prepared antigen which 53 upon administration to a person will result in immunity to influenza, pneumococcal 54 disease, shingles, or meningitis. to the influenza virus; provided, however, that a live 55 attenuated virus shall not be administered pursuant to this Code section to any individual 56 younger than 13 or older than 49 years of age; and provided, further, that a No live 57 attenuated virus shall not be administered pursuant to this Code section unless the patient 58 or his or her parent, if a minor, has signed an informed consent that he or she does not have a contraindication to this vaccine. The informed consent form shall list the 59 60 contraindications to the vaccine. 61 (5)(9) 'Vaccine order' 'Influenza vaccine order' means a prescription drug order, 62 contained in an influenza <u>a</u> vaccine protocol agreement, for influenza <u>a</u> vaccine issued by

63 a physician for a group of patients who meet certain criteria and to be administered by a

64 pharmacist or a nurse. An influenza <u>A</u> vaccine order shall also mean a prescription drug 65 order, contained in an influenza <u>a</u> vaccine protocol agreement, for epinephrine issued by 66 a physician for a group of patients who meet certain criteria and to be administered by a 67 pharmacist or a nurse only upon the occurrence of an actual or perceived anaphylactic 68 adverse reaction to the administered influenza vaccine provided that the influenza vaccine 69 protocol agreement sets forth the signs and symptoms that warrant the administration of 70 epinephrine.

(6)(10) 'Vaccine protocol agreement' 'Influenza vaccine protocol agreement' means a
written document mutually agreed upon and signed by a physician and a pharmacist or
by a physician and a nurse, by which document the physician prescribes influenza <u>a</u>
vaccine and epinephrine, if determined appropriate by the physician, by means of <del>an</del>
influenza <u>a</u> vaccine order for administration by a pharmacist or a nurse.

(7) 'Nurse' means a registered professional nurse as defined in paragraph (9) of Code
 Section 43-26-3. The term shall also mean a licensed practical nurse as defined in
 paragraph (5) of Code Section 43-26-32 who is regularly employed by a physician who
 actively engaged in the private practice of medicine.

- 80 (8) 'Pharmacist' means an individual licensed under Chapter 4 of Title 26 to engage in
   81 the practice of pharmacy in the State of Georgia.
- 82 (9) 'Pharmacy intern' means a pharmacy intern as defined in paragraph (19) of Code
   83 Section 26-4-5.

84 (10) 'Physician' means an individual licensed to practice medicine and surgery pursuant
 85 to this article and whose principal place of practice is located in this state.

86 (b) A physician engaged in the active practice of medicine may prescribe influenza <u>a</u> vaccine for a group of patients via an influenza <u>a</u> vaccine order contained in an influenza 87 88 <u>a</u> vaccine protocol agreement to be administered by a pharmacist, provided the physician 89 is registered with the vaccination registry established by the Department of Public Health 90 pursuant to Code Section 31-12-3.1, commonly known as the Georgia Registry of 91 Immunization Transactions and Services; the pharmacist is located within the county of 92 the physician's place of registration with the vaccination registry or a county contiguous 93 thereto, and; the pharmacist holds current certification in Basic Cardiac Life Support and 94 has completed a course of training accredited by the Accreditation Council for Pharmacy 95 Education or similar health authority or professional body approved by the Georgia State Board of Pharmacy; and the pharmacist completes a training program recognized by the 96 97 Centers for Disease Control and Prevention in the basics of immunology which focuses on practice implementation and legal and regulatory issues, composed of: (1) at least 12 hours 98 99 of self-study and an assessment exam; (2) at least eight hours of live seminar with a final 100 exam; and (3) a hands-on assessment of intramuscular and subcutaneous injection

101 <u>technique</u>. A physician who is a party to an influenza <u>a</u> vaccine protocol agreement may 102 also prescribe epinephrine via an influenza <u>a</u> vaccine order contained in an influenza <u>a</u> 103 vaccine protocol agreement for administration by a pharmacist upon the occurrence of an 104 actual or perceived anaphylactic adverse reaction to the administered influenza vaccine 105 provided that the influenza vaccine protocol agreement sets forth the signs and symptoms 106 that warrant the administration of epinephrine.

107 (c) A physician engaged in the active practice of medicine may prescribe influenza a 108 vaccine for a group of patients via an influenza <u>a</u> vaccine order contained in an influenza 109 <u>a</u> vaccine protocol agreement to be administered by a nurse, provided the physician is 110 registered with the vaccination registry established by the Department of Public Health pursuant to Code Section 31-12-3.1, commonly known as the Georgia Registry of 111 112 Immunization Transactions and Services, the nurse is located within the county of the 113 physician's place of registration with the vaccination registry or a county contiguous thereto, and the nurse holds current certification in Basic Cardiac Life Support. A 114 115 physician who is a party to an influenza <u>a</u> vaccine protocol agreement may also prescribe 116 epinephrine via an influenza a vaccine order contained in an influenza a vaccine protocol 117 agreement for administration by a nurse upon the occurrence of an actual or perceived 118 anaphylactic adverse reaction to the administered influenza vaccine provided that the 119 influenza vaccine protocol agreement sets forth the signs and symptoms that warrant the 120 administration of epinephrine.

(d) <u>A An influenza vaccine protocol agreement between a physician and a pharmacist or</u>
a physician and a nurse pursuant to this Code section shall, without limitation:

(1) Contain the current names, addresses, telephone numbers, and professional license
numbers of the physician and the pharmacist or nurse;

- (2) Contain a provision for immediate consultation between the pharmacist or nurse and
  the physician. If the physician is not available, the physician for purposes of consultation
  may designate another physician who concurs with the terms of the influenza vaccine
  protocol agreement;
- (3) Require the pharmacist or nurse to take a complete case history and determine
   whether the patient has had a physical examination within the past year and shall not
- 130 whether the patient has had a physical examination within the past year and shall not
- administer a vaccine to a patient with any condition for which such vaccine is
   contraindicated;
- 133 (3)(4) Require the pharmacist or nurse to provide the influenza vaccine recipient with the
- 134 appropriate and current Vaccine Information Statement (VIS) as provided by the federal
- 135 Centers for Disease Control and Prevention;

136 (5) Require the pharmacist or nurse to provide written information to the vaccine 137 recipient to be developed by the Department of Public Health on the importance of 138 having and periodically seeing a primary care physician; 139 (6) Require the pharmacist or nurse to provide each new vaccine recipient with a 140 personal immunization card on card stock paper containing the vaccine recipient's name, 141 the pharmacist's or nurse's name and phone number, the name and dosage of the vaccine, 142 the location of injection on the vaccine recipient, and the date of the administration of the 143 vaccine in legible writing or printed type in a format made available by the Department 144 of Public Health. The patient shall produce such card when he or she has subsequent 145 vaccines and the pharmacist or nurse shall update such card, unless the patient does not have such card, in which case, a new card shall be provided. The written information 146 147 required pursuant to paragraph (5) of this subsection may be included on the card 148 provided pursuant to this paragraph; 149 (4)(7) Require the pharmacist or nurse or his or her employer to retain documentation 150 of each dose of influenza vaccine administered. Such documentation shall include, but 151 not be limited to: 152 (A) The administering pharmacist's or nurse's name, address, telephone number, and professional license number; 153 154 (B) The name, dose, manufacturer, and lot number of the influenza vaccine; (C) The vaccine recipient's name, address, date of birth, and telephone number; 155 156 (D) The date of administration and injection site; 157 (E) A signed and dated consent form by which the vaccine recipient acknowledges 158 receipt of the VIS Vaccine Information Statement, and consents to the administration 159 of the influenza vaccine, and authorizes the pharmacy or nurse to notify the vaccine 160 recipient's primary care provider of the vaccine administered to the vaccine recipient; 161 and 162 (F) Any adverse events or complications that occur; 163 (8) Require the pharmacist or nurse to make documented reasonable efforts to obtain the name of the vaccine recipient's primary care provider and to notify such primary care 164 165 provider of the vaccine administered by the pharmacist or nurse within 72 hours of 166 administration; (9) Require the pharmacist or nurse to administer the vaccine to a patient in a private 167 168 room, area with a privacy screen, or other interior area in which the patient's privacy can 169 be maintained. In no event shall a pharmacist or nurse administer a vaccine to a patient 170 in a manner that is designed so that the patient can be served while remaining in his or 171 her personal vehicle. This paragraph shall not apply to mass immunizations in the event

172 of a public health emergency or for purposes of training in which vaccinations are 173 administered to large groups of people at one or more locations in a short interval of time; 174 (5)(10) Require the pharmacist or nurse to enter the patient's influenza vaccine 175 information in the Georgia Registry of Immunization Transactions and Services within 176 the registry's designated time frame, or as designated by the Department of Public Health. 177 The Georgia Drugs and Narcotics Agency shall have the authority to impose sanctions 178 in accordance with subsection (r) of this Code section on any person subject to the 179 requirements of this paragraph who does not submit the information required by this 180 paragraph and to notify the delegating physician and the applicable licensing board for 181 such person of violations of this paragraph; 182 (6)(11) Require, as a condition of administration of the influenza vaccine, the influenza 183 vaccine recipient to remain under the observation of the administering pharmacist or

nurse for a period of not less than 15 minutes immediately subsequent to the administration of the influenza vaccine;

(7)(12) Contain procedures to follow up on the occurrence of an adverse event or
 complication including, if prescribed via an influenza <u>a</u> vaccine order contained in an
 influenza <u>a</u> vaccine protocol agreement, the administration of epinephrine;

(8)(13) Provide for prioritization of influenza vaccine recipients in the event the supply
 of influenza <u>a</u> vaccine is limited; and

191 (14) Require the pharmacist or nurse to maintain individual liability insurance coverage

192 or be individually covered by his or her employer's liability insurance coverage in an

amount not less than \$250,000.00 to cover claims arising from administration of vaccines

- 194 by the pharmacist or nurse pursuant to a vaccine protocol agreement and to provide proof
- 195 of such coverage to the physician for submission to the board with the vaccine protocol

196 <u>agreement. The pharmacist or nurse shall also retain a copy of the proof of insurance</u>

197 coverage, including the name of the insurer and policy number, onsite at his or her

primary location for inspection by the Georgia Drugs and Narcotics Agency, upon
 request;

200 (15) Require the pharmacist or nurse to post proof of the vaccine protocol agreement,

201 including a list of the vaccines authorized by such protocol, in a conspicuous location
 202 within the pharmacy, local health department, or other setting in which the vaccine is

- 203 <u>being administered;</u>
- 204 (16) Require the pharmacist or nurse to submit a signed and notarized affidavit to the
   205 physician attesting to the following:
- 206 (A) Compliance with paragraph (14) of this subsection regarding maintenance of
   207 liability insurance;

(B) Verification that the pharmacist or nurse holds current certification in Basic
 Cardiac Life Support as required by subsections (b) and (c) of this Code section and,
 for pharmacists, verification of completion of immunology training as required by

211 <u>subsection (b) of this Code section;</u>

212 (C) The pharmacist or nurse has a copy of the vaccine protocol agreement and agrees
 213 to comply with its requirements; and

214 (D) Identification of the pharmacist's or nurse's location or locations in which he or she

- 215 will be administering vaccinations pursuant to the vaccine protocol agreement.
- 216 The pharmacist or nurse shall keep a copy of the affidavit onsite at his or her primary
- 217 <u>location for inspection by the Georgia Drugs and Narcotics Agency, upon request. The</u>
   218 <u>Georgia Drugs and Narcotics Agency shall have the authority to impose sanctions in</u>
- 219 accordance with subsection (r) of this Code section on any person subject to the

220 requirements of this paragraph who does not submit the information required by this

- 221 paragraph and to notify the delegating physician and the applicable licensing board for
- such person of violations of this paragraph; and
- (9)(17) Be renewed and, if necessary, revised or updated biennially by the physician and
   the pharmacist or nurse. <u>A An influenza</u> vaccine protocol agreement that is not renewed
   biennially shall expire.
- (e) A pharmacist who is a party to an influenza <u>a</u> vaccine protocol agreement pursuant to
  this Code section shall not delegate the administration of influenza <u>a</u> vaccine to any
  individual other than a pharmacy intern under the direct supervision of the pharmacist
  whether or not any such other individual is under the supervision, direct or otherwise, of
  the pharmacist.
- 231 (f) A nurse who is a party to an influenza <u>a</u> vaccine protocol agreement pursuant to this 232 Code section shall not delegate the administration of influenza a vaccine to any individual, 233 whether or not any such individual is under the supervision, direct or otherwise, of the 234 nurse; provided, however, that notwithstanding the requirement of employment by a physician in paragraph (7)(4) of subsection (a) of this Code section, a registered 235 236 professional nurse who is a party to an influenza <u>a vaccine</u> protocol agreement pursuant to this Code section may delegate the administration of influenza a vaccine to a licensed 237 238 practical nurse under the direct on-site supervision of the registered professional nurse.
- (g) Notwithstanding any law to the contrary, a nurse acting pursuant to an influenza <u>a</u>
   vaccine protocol agreement as provided in this Code section may possess and transport
   influenza <u>such</u> vaccine and epinephrine.
- (h) A pharmacist or nurse administering influenza vaccines pursuant to an influenza <u>a</u>
  vaccine protocol agreement authorized by this Code section shall maintain policies and
  procedures for the handling and disposal of used or contaminated equipment and supplies.

(i) Nothing in this Code section shall be construed to authorize a physician to prescribe
any <u>other</u> vaccines or other drugs pursuant to an influenza <u>a</u> vaccine protocol agreement
or influenza vaccine order contained in an influenza <u>a</u> vaccine protocol agreement other
than influenza those vaccines and epinephrine <u>specifically authorized in such vaccine</u>
protocol agreement or vaccine order.

250 (j) A delegating physician may not enter into an influenza <u>a</u> vaccine protocol agreement 251 with more than ten pharmacists or nurses, or any combination thereof, at any one time; 252 provided, however, and notwithstanding the geographic limitations provided in subsections 253 (b) and (c) of this Code section, a delegating physician may enter into an influenza a 254 vaccine protocol agreement with more than ten pharmacists or nurses, or any combination 255 thereof, at any one time so long as the pharmacists or nurses are in the same public health 256 district as established pursuant to Code Section 31-3-15 and are employees or agents of the 257 same corporate entity.

(k) It shall be unlawful for a physician who is employed by a pharmacist or nurse to enter
into an influenza <u>a</u> vaccine protocol agreement or otherwise delegate medical acts to such
pharmacist or nurse. It shall be unlawful for a physician who is employed by a pharmacy
to enter into an influenza <u>a</u> vaccine protocol agreement or otherwise delegate medical acts
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to enter into an influenza <u>a</u> vaccine protocol agreement or otherwise delegate medical acts
to a pharmacist or nurse who is also employed by such pharmacy.

(1) The board shall have the authority to promulgate rules and regulations governing a
physician who is a party to an influenza <u>a</u> vaccine protocol agreement in order to carry out
the intent and purposes of this Code section. Further, the board shall:

(1) Require that the influenza vaccine protocol agreement, along with the affidavit by the
 pharmacist or nurse submitted pursuant to paragraph (16) of subsection (d) of this Code
 section and the proof of insurance required pursuant to paragraph (14) of subsection (d)
 of this Code section, be filed by the physician with the board and be made available by
 the board for public inspection; and

(2) Promulgate by rule an approved standard protocol template that may be utilized as
 an influenza <u>a</u> vaccine protocol agreement and make such template available on the
 board's website.

(m) Nothing in this Code section shall be construed to require a physician to enter into an
influenza <u>a</u> vaccine protocol agreement. A public or private managed care system, health
plan, hospital, insurance company, or similar entity shall not require a physician,
pharmacist, or nurse to enter into an influenza <u>a</u> vaccine protocol agreement as a condition
for participation in or reimbursement from such entity.

(n) No physician who complies with the provisions of this Code section shall be subjectto criminal or civil liability or discipline for unprofessional conduct for:

281 (1) Entering into an influenza <u>a</u> vaccine protocol agreement with a pharmacist or nurse;

282	(2) Issuing an influenza <u>a</u> vaccine order contained in an influenza <u>a</u> vaccine protocol
283	agreement with a pharmacist or nurse; or
284	(3) The acts or omissions of a pharmacist or nurse pursuant to an influenza $\underline{a}$ vaccine
285	protocol agreement including the administration of influenza $\underline{a}$ vaccine or epinephrine.
286	Nothing in this subsection shall be interpreted as altering liability of an employer for acts
287	of his or her employees.
288	(o) This Code section shall not apply to any activities conducted within a hospital,
289	physician's office, nursing home, or other health care facility designated by the department
290	or <u>conducted</u> within any other facility or entity owned, operated, or leased by a hospital.
291	(p) This Code section shall not be interpreted as limiting the authority of any authorized
292	person to dispense or administer influenza vaccine vaccines or other medications.
293	(q) No influenza vaccine protocol agreement entered into pursuant to this Code section
294	shall permit a pharmacist or nurse to administer an any of the following:
295	(1) An influenza vaccine to any child under the age of 13 without an individual
296	prescription from a physician;
297	(2) A pneumococcal disease vaccine to any child under the age of 18 without an
298	individual prescription from a physician;
299	(3) Any vaccines containing a live attenuated virus to a child under the age of 13; or
300	(4) A meningitis vaccine to any child under the age of 18.
301	and consent Consent of the child's parent or legal guardian shall be a condition precedent
302	to the administration of an influenza <u>a</u> vaccine to a child under the age of 18.
303	(r)(1) A pharmacist or nurse who knowingly does not comply with paragraph (14) of
304	subsection (d) of this Code section may be assessed a fine of up to \$2,500.00 by the
305	board.
306	(2) A pharmacist or nurse who knowingly administers a vaccine without a vaccine
307	protocol agreement as required by this Code section may be assessed a fine of up to
308	\$2,500.00 and may be prohibited from administering vaccines pursuant to this Code
309	section for up to one year as determined by the board.
310	(3) A pharmacist or nurse who knowingly does not comply with paragraph (6) of
311	subsection (d) of this Code section may be subject to the following sanctions by the
312	board:
313	(A) Upon the first violation, the issuance of a warning:
314	(B) Upon the second violation, a fine of up \$500.00; and
315	(C) Upon a third or subsequent violation, prohibited from administering vaccines
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316 pursuant to this Code section for up to one year.

317	(4) A pharmacist or nurse who knowingly does not comply with paragraph (15) of
318	subsection (d) of this Code section may be subject to the following sanctions by the
319	board:
320	(A) Upon the first or second violation, the issuance of a warning:
321	(B) Upon a third or subsequent violation, prohibited from administering vaccines
322	pursuant to this Code section for up to six months.
323	(5) A pharmacist or nurse who knowingly does not comply with paragraph (10) or (16)
324	of subsection (d) of this Code section may be subject to the following sanctions by the
325	Georgia Drugs and Narcotics Agency:
326	(A) Upon the first violation, the issuance of a warning;
327	(B) Upon the second violation, a fine of up to \$5,000.00; and
328	(C) Upon a third or subsequent violation, prohibited from administering vaccines
329	pursuant to this Code section.
330	(6) The sanctions contained in this subsection shall be supplemental to any other
331	sanctions or penalties to which a pharmacist or nurse may otherwise be subject."
332	SECTION 3.
333	All laws and parts of laws in conflict with this Act are repealed.
