**ARTICLE 1**

**FINDINGS**

1.19 Section 1. **FINDINGS.**

1.20 (a) The Legislative Commission on Ending Poverty in Minnesota called for steps to  
1.21 bring an end to poverty by 2020, yet a large number of Minnesotans continue to struggle  
1.22 to make ends meet. More than one in ten Minnesotans lives in poverty, and three in ten are  
1.23 struggling to meet basic needs. Some workers cannot afford housing and go from their  
1.24 jobs to a homeless shelter at night. More than half the time has passed between the year in  
1.25 which the Poverty Commission wrote the report and the year 2020, yet little progress has  
1.26 been made and bolder action is needed.

1.27 (b) Because low-income people frequently need government assistance to feed  
1.28 their families, the most effective welfare reform is to help Minnesota workers succeed

2.1 in the economy. This includes ensuring that there are jobs available to them, that they  
 2.2 have access to affordable child care, and that, through higher wages and an increase in  
 2.3 the working family tax credit, they are able to afford basic needs. Helping low-income  
 2.4 workers and their families will boost their productivity, improve the economy, and reduce  
 2.5 financial assistance costs for the state.

## 2.6 ARTICLE 2

### 2.7 CHILD CARE ASSISTANCE ENHANCEMENT AND EXPANSION TO 2.8 COVER ALL LOW-INCOME WORKERS

2.9 Section 1. Minnesota Statutes 2014, section 119B.02, subdivision 1, is amended to read:

2.10 Subdivision 1. **Child care services.** The commissioner shall develop standards  
 2.11 for county and human services boards to provide child care services to enable eligible  
 2.12 families to participate in employment, training, or education programs. ~~Within the limits~~  
 2.13 ~~of available appropriations,~~ The commissioner shall distribute money to counties to  
 2.14 reduce the costs of child care for eligible families. The commissioner shall adopt rules to  
 2.15 govern the program in accordance with this section. The rules must establish a sliding  
 2.16 schedule of fees for parents receiving child care services. The rules shall provide that  
 2.17 funds received as a lump-sum payment of child support arrearages shall not be counted  
 2.18 as income to a family in the month received but shall be prorated over the 12 months  
 2.19 following receipt and added to the family income during those months. The commissioner  
 2.20 shall maximize the use of federal money under title I and title IV of Public Law 104-193,  
 2.21 the Personal Responsibility and Work Opportunity Reconciliation Act of 1996, and  
 2.22 other programs that provide federal or state reimbursement for child care services for  
 2.23 low-income families who are in education, training, job search, or other activities allowed  
 2.24 under those programs. Money appropriated under this section must be coordinated with  
 2.25 the programs that provide federal reimbursement for child care services to accomplish  
 2.26 this purpose. ~~Federal reimbursement obtained must be allocated to the county that spent~~  
 2.27 ~~money for child care that is federally reimbursable under programs that provide federal~~  
 2.28 ~~reimbursement for child care services.~~ The counties commissioner shall use the federal  
 2.29 money to expand child care services. The commissioner may adopt rules under chapter 14  
 2.30 to implement and coordinate federal program requirements.

2.31 Sec. 2. Minnesota Statutes 2014, section 119B.02, subdivision 2, is amended to read:

2.32 Subd. 2. **Contractual agreements with tribes.** The commissioner may enter into  
 2.33 contractual agreements with a federally recognized Indian tribe with a reservation in  
 2.34 Minnesota to carry out the responsibilities of county human service agencies to the extent

3.1 necessary for the tribe to operate child care assistance programs for families eligible under  
 3.2 ~~sections 119B.03 119B.09 and 119B.05 119B.10~~. An agreement may allow the state  
 3.3 to make payments for child care assistance services provided under ~~section 119B.05~~  
 3.4 this chapter. The commissioner shall consult with the affected county or counties in the  
 3.5 contractual agreement negotiations, if the county or counties wish to be included, in  
 3.6 order to avoid the duplication of county and tribal child care services. ~~Funding to support~~  
 3.7 ~~services under section 119B.03 may be transferred to the federally recognized Indian tribe~~

3.14 Subd. 3. **Eligible participants.** Families that meet the eligibility requirements  
 3.15 under sections ~~119B.07, 119B.09, and 119B.10, except MFIP participants, diversionary~~  
 3.16 ~~work program, and transition year families~~ are eligible for child care assistance under the  
 3.17 basic sliding fee child care assistance program. Families enrolled in the ~~basic sliding fee~~  
 3.18 child care assistance program shall be continued until they are no longer eligible. Child  
 3.19 care assistance provided through the child care fund is considered assistance to the parent.

 4.15 provide alternative methods of applying for assistance, including, but not limited to, a mail

5.22 develop and distribute consumer information on the at-home infant child care program to  
5.23 assist parents of infants or expectant parents in making informed child care decisions.

6.1 (1) a description of strategies to coordinate and maximize public and private  
 6.2 community resources, including school districts, health care facilities, government  
 6.3 agencies, neighborhood organizations, and other resources knowledgeable in early  
 6.4 childhood development, in particular to coordinate child care assistance with existing  
 6.5 community-based programs and service providers including child care resource and  
 6.6 referral programs, early childhood family education, school readiness, Head Start, local  
 6.7 interagency early intervention committees, special education services, early childhood

 6.17 early intervention committees, potential collaborative partners and agencies involved in  
 6.18 the provision of care and education to young children, and allowing sufficient time for  
 6.19 public review and comment; and

6.20 (3) information as requested by the department to ensure compliance with the child  
 6.21 care fund statutes and rules promulgated by the commissioner.

6.22 The commissioner shall notify counties within 90 days of the date the plan is  
 6.23 submitted whether the plan is approved or the corrections or information needed to approve  
 6.24 the plan. The commissioner shall withhold a county's allocation until it has an approved  
 6.25 plan. ~~Plans not approved by the end of the second quarter after the plan is due may result~~  
 6.26 ~~in a 25 percent reduction in allocation. Plans not approved by the end of the third quarter~~

 7.17 Persons who are seeking employment and who are eligible for assistance under this ~~section~~  
 7.18 chapter are eligible to receive up to 240 hours of child care assistance per calendar year.

7.19 (b) Employed persons who work at least an average of 20 hours and full-time students  
 7.20 who work at least an average of ten hours a week and receive at least a minimum wage  
 7.21 for all hours worked are eligible for continued child care assistance for employment. For  
 7.22 purposes of this section, work-study programs must be counted as employment. Child care

8.2 stabilization plan. The following persons are also eligible for child care assistance:

8.3 (1) persons who are participating in work, job search, job support, employment, or  
8.4 training activities as required in their job search support or employment plan or in appeals,  
8.5 hearings, assessments, or orientations according to chapter 256J;

8.6 (2) persons who are participating in social services activities under chapter 256J as  
8.7 required in their employment plan approved according to chapter 256J;

8.8 (3) families who are participating in programs as required in tribal contracts under  
8.9 section 119B.02, subdivision 2, or 256.01, subdivision 2; and

8.10 (4) persons who are participating in services or activities that are included in an

8.14 from the child care fund, if they are financially eligible under the sliding fee scale set  
8.15 by the commissioner in section 119B.12.

8.16 **Subd. 3. Child care assistance during education.** (a) The following persons are  
8.17 eligible for child care assistance for education or training:

8.18 (1) persons who meet the requirements of section 119B.09 who are enrolled in  
8.19 remedial or basic education or English as a second language, or persons up to the age of  
8.20 19 who are enrolled in an educational program to attain a high school diploma or general  
8.21 equivalency diploma;

8.22 (2) persons who meet the requirements of this section and section 119B.09 who  
8.23 receive child care assistance to reduce the costs of child care for education when employed  
8.24 an average of at least ten hours per week under subdivision 1, and are not receiving  
8.25 MFIP benefits; and

8.26 (3) persons who meet the requirements of this section and section 119B.09 who  
8.27 receive child care assistance to reduce the costs of child care for education when enrolled  
8.28 in a postsecondary educational institution as a full-time undergraduate student, and are not  
8.29 receiving MFIP benefits.

8.30 (b) Notwithstanding subdivisions 5 and 6, assistance for persons under paragraph  
8.31 (a), clause (3), is limited to 48 months or the length of time necessary to complete the  
8.32 degree, whichever is shorter.

8.33 **Subd. 4. Satisfactory progress.** Students enrolled in an education program must  
8.34 be making satisfactory progress toward completion of the program as stipulated in the  
8.35 school's satisfactory progress policy.



9.1 Subd. 5. **Limiting duration of training.** Counties may not limit the duration of  
9.2 child care subsidies for a person in an employment or educational program, except when  
9.3 the person is found to be ineligible under the child care fund eligibility standards. Any  
9.4 limitation must be based on a person's employment or family stabilization plan in the case  
9.5 of an MFIP participant.

9.6 Subd. 6. **Maximum length of time for training.** The maximum length of time a  
9.7 participant is eligible for child care assistance under the child care fund for education and  
9.8 training is no more than the maximum time allowed to complete the credit requirements  
9.9 for an associate or baccalaureate degree as stipulated in the school's satisfactory progress  
9.10 policy. This length of time excludes basic or remedial education programs, English as  
9.11 a second language, high school, and general equivalency diploma programs needed to  
9.12 prepare for postsecondary education or employment.

9.13 Subd. 7. **MFIP student moves to another county.** If an MFIP participant who is  
9.14 receiving child care assistance under this chapter moves to another county, continues  
9.15 to participate in educational or training programs authorized in the MFIP participant's  
9.16 employment or family stabilization plan, and continues to be eligible for child care  
9.17 assistance under this chapter, the MFIP participant must receive continued child care  
9.18 assistance from the county responsible for the MFIP participant's current employment or  
9.19 family stabilization plan under section 256G.07.

9.20 Sec. 14. Minnesota Statutes 2014, section 119B.11, subdivision 1, is amended to read:

9.21 Subdivision 1. **County contributions required.** (a) In addition to payments from  
9.22 ~~basic sliding fee child care assistance~~ program participants, each county shall contribute  
9.23 from county tax or other sources a fixed local match equal to its calendar year 1996  
9.24 required county contribution reduced by the administrative funding loss that would have  
9.25 occurred in state fiscal year 1996 under section 119B.15. The commissioner shall recover  
9.26 funds from the county as necessary to bring county expenditures into compliance with this  
9.27 subdivision. The commissioner may accept county contributions, including contributions  
9.28 above the fixed local match, in order to make state payments.

10.6 Subd. 2. **Parent fee.** A family must be assessed a parent fee for each service period.  
10.7 A family's parent fee must be a fixed percentage of its annual gross income. Parent fees  
10.8 must apply to families eligible for child care assistance under ~~sections 119B.03 and~~  
10.9 ~~119B.05~~ section 119B.09. Income must be as defined in section 119B.011, subdivision 15.  
10.10 The fixed percent is based on the relationship of the family's annual gross income to 100  
10.11 percent of the annual state median income. Parent fees must begin at 75 percent of the

 20.18 most recent March 31.

20.19 (b) Ten percent of the funds available for allocation to employment administrators  
 20.20 under the program must be allocated at the discretion of the commissioner to employment  
 20.21 administrators:

20.22 (1) who will maximize the use of the funds through coordination with other  
 20.23 programs and state, local, and federal agencies, through the use of matching funds or  
 20.24 through the involvement of low-income constituent groups;

20.25 (2) who have demonstrated need beyond the allocation available under paragraph  
 20.26 (a); or

20.27 (3) who have demonstrated outstanding performance in job creation.

20.28 Sec. 5. **ALLOCATION WITHIN WORKFORCE SERVICE AREAS;**  
 20.29 **PRIORITIES.**

20.30 Subdivision 1. **Among job applicants.** Allocation of funds among eligible job  
 20.31 applicants within a workforce service area shall be determined by the employment  
 20.32 administrator in each workforce service area. The employment administrator shall give  
 20.33 priority to:

20.34 (1) applicants living in households with no other income source;

21.1 (2) applicants who would otherwise be eligible to participate in the Minnesota  
21.2 family investment program or the diversionary work program; and

21.3 (3) veterans as defined under Minnesota Statutes, section 196.21, subdivision 2.

21.4 Subd. 2. **Among employers.** The employment administrator within each workforce  
21.5 service area shall determine allocation of funds among eligible employers within  
21.6 a workforce service area according to the priorities in section 9. The employment  
21.7 administrator shall give priority to funding private sector jobs to the extent that eligible  
21.8 businesses apply for funds. No more than 50 percent of the funds may be allocated for  
21.9 jobs with eligible government and nonprofit agencies during the biennium.

21.10 **Sec. 6. USE OF FUNDS.**

21.11 Subdivision 1. **Allowable uses of funds.** Funds appropriated for the purposes of  
21.12 sections 1 to 14 may be used as follows:

21.13 (1) to provide a state contribution for wages and fringe benefits for eligible job  
21.14 applicants for a maximum of 1,040 hours over a maximum period of 26 weeks per job  
21.15 applicant. For eligible job applicants participating in a job training program, the state  
21.16 contribution for wages may be used for a maximum period of 26 weeks per job applicant.

21.29 the employment administrators shall reallocate funds from other sources to cover the  
21.30 administrative costs of this program whenever possible;

21.31 (4) to provide child care services or subsidies to applicants employed under sections  
21.32 1 to 14;

21.33 (5) to provide workers' compensation coverage to applicants employed by  
21.34 government or nonprofit agencies under sections 1 to 14;

22.1 (6) to provide job search assistance, labor market orientation, job seeking skills,  
 22.2 and referral for other services; and

22.3 (7) to purchase supplies and materials for projects creating permanent improvements  
 22.4 to public property in an amount not to exceed one percent of the funds appropriated.

22.5 Subd. 2. **Cancellation and reallocation.** Any funds allocated to the workforce  
 22.6 service area for which there is no spending plan approved by the commissioner or  
 22.7 which are significantly underspent in the reporting period shall cancel back to the  
 22.8 Minnesota emergency employment development account and must be reallocated by the  
 22.9 commissioner to other employment administrators.

22.10 Sec. 7. **EMPLOYMENT ADMINISTRATORS; POWERS AND DUTIES.**

22.11 Subdivision 1. **In general.** The employment administrator for each workforce  
 22.12 service area has the powers and duties given in this section and any additional duties  
 22.13 given by the commissioner.

22.14 Subd. 2. **Employment plan.** Each employment administrator shall develop an  
 22.15 emergency employment development plan for the workforce service area under guidelines  
 22.16 developed by the commissioner and submit it to the commissioner within the period  
 22.17 allowed by the commissioner. To the extent feasible, the employment administrator shall  
 22.18 seek input from potential eligible employers and the public.

22.19 Subd. 3. **Outreach.** Each employment administrator shall publicize the program  
 22.20 within the workforce service area to seek maximum participation by eligible job applicants  
 22.21 and employers.

22.22 Subd. 4. **Contracts.** Each employment administrator shall enter into contracts with  
 22.23 eligible employers setting forth the terms of their participation in the program as required  
 22.24 by sections 1 to 14.

22.25 Subd. 5. **Screening and coordination.** Each employment administrator shall screen  
 22.26 job applicants and employers to achieve the best possible placement of eligible job  
 22.27 applicants with eligible employers.

22.28 Subd. 6. **Eligible job applicant priority lists.** Each employment administrator  
 22.29 shall maintain a list of eligible job applicants unable to secure employment under the  
 22.30 program at the time of application. The list shall prioritize eligible job applicants pursuant  
 22.31 to section 5, subdivision 1, and shall be used to fill jobs with eligible employers as they  
 22.32 become available.

22.33 Subd. 7. **Coordination of education and training programs.** Each employment  
 22.34 administrator shall cooperate with local educational and training institutions to coordinate

23.1 and publicize the availability of their resources to assure that applicants may receive  
 23.2 training needed before or while employed in jobs which are available under the program.

23.3 Subd. 8. **Materials.** Each employment administrator may disburse funds not to  
 23.4 exceed one percent of the amount allocated to the service delivery area for the purchase of  
 23.5 supplies and materials for projects creating permanent improvements to public property.

23.6 Sec. 8. **ELIGIBLE GOVERNMENT AND NONPROFIT AGENCY**  
 23.7 **EMPLOYMENT.**

23.8 A government or nonprofit agency is an eligible employer with respect to temporary  
 23.9 employment projects that are determined by the employment administrator to have  
 23.10 long-term benefit to or are needed by the community, including but not limited to jobs  
 23.11 in permanent public improvement projects, residential or public building weatherization  
 23.12 projects, reforestation projects, mineland reclamation projects, planting or tree trimming  
 23.13 projects, soil conservation projects, natural resource development projects, and community  
 23.14 social service programs such as child care and home health care.

23.15 Sec. 9. **BUSINESS EMPLOYMENT.**

23.16 Subdivision 1. **Eligible businesses.** A business employer is an eligible employer if  
 23.17 it enters into a written contract with the employment administrator in its workforce service  
 23.18 area and includes in the contract assurances that:

23.19 (1) funds received by a business shall be used only as permitted under sections 1 to 14;

23.20 (2) the business has submitted a plan to the employment administrator:

23.21 (i) describing the duties and proposed compensation of each employee proposed to  
 23.22 be hired under the program; and

23.23 (ii) demonstrating that, with the funds provided under sections 1 to 14, the business  
 23.24 is likely to succeed and continue to employ persons hired under the program;

23.25 (3) the business will use funds exclusively for compensation and fringe benefits of  
 23.26 eligible job applicants and will provide employees hired with these funds with fringe  
 23.27 benefits and other terms and conditions of employment comparable to those provided to  
 23.28 other employees of the business who do comparable work;

23.29 (4) the funds are necessary to allow the business to begin operation, or to employ  
 23.30 additional people, but not to fill positions which would be filled even in the absence of  
 23.31 funds from this program;

23.32 (5) the business will cooperate with the commissioner and the employment  
 23.33 administrator in collecting data to assess the results of the program; and

24.1 (6) the business is in compliance with all applicable affirmative action, fair labor,  
 24.2 health, safety, and environmental standards.

24.3 Subd. 2. **Priorities.** In allocating funds among eligible businesses, the employment  
 24.4 administrator shall give priority to businesses which best satisfy the following criteria:

24.5 (1) have a high potential for growth and long-term job creation;

24.6 (2) are labor intensive;

24.7 (3) meet the definition of a small business as defined in Minnesota Statutes, section  
 24.8 645.445;

24.9 (4) make high use of local and Minnesota resources;

24.10 (5) are under ownership of women or minorities;

24.11 (6) make extensive use of new technology;

24.12 (7) produce energy conserving materials or services or are involved in development  
 24.13 of renewable sources of energy; and

24.14 (8) have their primary place of business in Minnesota.

24.15 Subd. 3. **Employer accountability.** (a) A business receiving funds under this  
 24.16 program is expected to retain employees at least six months beyond the initial six-month  
 24.17 subsidized period. In the event an employer terminates participation in the subsidy program  
 24.18 during the initial six-month subsidy phase for any participant, the employer shall pay back  
 24.19 20 percent of the subsidies received to date. In the event an employer has not retained  
 24.20 a participant at least 90 days beyond the subsidy phase, the employer shall pay back 20  
 24.21 percent of the wage subsidies received. In the event a business employer has retained a  
 24.22 participant 180 days beyond the subsidy period, a business employer shall be eligible for a  
 24.23 bonus equivalent to \$2 per hour for the hours the participant worked during those 180 days.

24.24 (b) If an employer dismisses an employee for good cause or the employee chooses to  
 24.25 leave the position and the employer works in good faith with the program administrator  
 24.26 to employ and train another person referred by the employment administrator, the  
 24.27 accountability conditions shall apply as if the original participant had fulfilled the  
 24.28 employment timeline.

24.29 Sec. 10. **MINNESOTA EMERGENCY EMPLOYMENT DEVELOPMENT**  
 24.30 **ACCOUNT.**

24.31 The Minnesota emergency employment development account is created in the state  
 24.32 treasury. All payments from businesses under section 9 shall be deposited in this account,  
 24.33 and all funds in the account are appropriated to the commissioner of employment and  
 24.34 economic development for the purpose of making disbursements pursuant to section 6.



25.1 Sec. 11. **WORKER DISPLACEMENT PROHIBITED.**

25.2 Subdivision 1. Layoffs; work reductions. An eligible employer may not terminate,  
25.3 lay off, or reduce the working hours of an employee for the purpose of hiring an individual  
25.4 with funds available under sections 1 to 14.

25.5 Subd. 2. Hiring during layoffs. An eligible employer may not hire an individual  
25.6 with funds available under sections 1 to 14 if any other person has been laid off from the  
25.7 same or a substantially equivalent job within the previous six months.

25.8 Subd. 3. Employer certification. In order to qualify as an eligible employer, a  
25.9 government or nonprofit agency or business must certify to the employment administrator  
25.10 that each job created and funded under sections 1 to 14:

25.11 (1) will result in an increase in employment opportunities over those which would  
25.12 otherwise be available;

25.13 (2) will not result in the displacement of currently employed workers, including  
25.14 partial displacement such as reduction in hours of nonovertime work, wages, or  
25.15 employment benefits; and

25.16 (3) will not impair existing contracts for service or result in the substitution of  
25.17 program funds for other funds in connection with work that would otherwise be performed.

25.18 Sec. 12. **TERMINATION; NOTIFICATION.**

25.19 (a) On the date the program is terminated, any balance remaining in the Minnesota  
25.20 emergency employment development account established under section 10 shall cancel  
25.21 to the general fund. Any payments received under section 10 on or after that date shall  
25.22 be deposited in the general fund.

25.23 (b) The commissioner shall immediately terminate the Minnesota emergency  
25.24 employment development program if and when none of the money appropriated under  
25.25 section 13 remains.

25.26 Sec. 13. **APPROPRIATION.**

25.27 \$200,000,000 is appropriated from the general fund to the commissioner for  
25.28 deposit in the Minnesota emergency employment development account each year in the  
25.29 2016-2017 biennium for the Minnesota Emergency Employment Development (MEED)  
25.30 Act of 2015. Any unexpended balance remaining at the end of the fiscal year does not  
25.31 cancel and is available until expended.

25.32 Sec. 14. **EFFECTIVE DATE.**

25.33 This article is effective the day following final enactment.

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**119B.011 DEFINITIONS.**

Subd. 20. **Transition year families.** "Transition year families" means families who have received MFIP assistance, or who were eligible to receive MFIP assistance after choosing to discontinue receipt of the cash portion of MFIP assistance under section 256J.31, subdivision 12, or families who have received DWP assistance under section 256J.95 for at least three of the last six months before losing eligibility for MFIP or DWP. Transition year child care may be used to support employment or job search. Transition year child care is not available to families who have been disqualified from MFIP or DWP due to fraud.

Subd. 20a. **Transition year extension families.** "Transition year extension families" means families who have completed their transition year of child care assistance under this subdivision and who are eligible for, but on a waiting list for, services under section 119B.03. For purposes of sections 119B.03, subdivision 3, and 119B.05, subdivision 1, clause (2), families participating in extended transition year shall not be considered transition year families. Transition year extension child care may be used to support employment or a job search that meets the requirements of section 119B.10 for the length of time necessary for families to be moved from the basic sliding fee waiting list into the basic sliding fee program.

**119B.03 BASIC SLIDING FEE PROGRAM.**

Subdivision 1. **Notice of allocation.** By October 1 of each year, the commissioner shall notify all counties of their final child care fund program allocation.

Subd. 2. **Waiting list.** Each county that receives funds under this section must keep a written record and report to the commissioner the number of eligible families who have applied for a child care subsidy or have requested child care assistance. Counties shall perform a preliminary determination of eligibility when a family requests child care assistance. At a minimum, a county must make a preliminary determination of eligibility based on family size, income, and authorized activity. A family seeking child care assistance must provide the required information to the county. A family that appears to be eligible must be put on a waiting list if funds are not immediately available. The waiting list must identify students in need of child care. Counties must review and update their waiting list at least every six months.

Subd. 4. **Funding priority.** (a) First priority for child care assistance under the basic sliding fee program must be given to eligible non-MFIP families who do not have a high school or general equivalency diploma or who need remedial and basic skill courses in order to pursue employment or to pursue education leading to employment and who need child care assistance to participate in the education program. This includes student parents as defined under section 119B.011, subdivision 19b. Within this priority, the following subpriorities must be used:

- (1) child care needs of minor parents;
- (2) child care needs of parents under 21 years of age; and
- (3) child care needs of other parents within the priority group described in this paragraph.

(b) Second priority must be given to parents who have completed their MFIP or DWP transition year, or parents who are no longer receiving or eligible for diversionary work program supports.

(c) Third priority must be given to families who are eligible for portable basic sliding fee assistance through the portability pool under subdivision 9.

(d) Fourth priority must be given to families in which at least one parent is a veteran as defined under section 197.447.

(e) Families under paragraph (b) must be added to the basic sliding fee waiting list on the date they begin the transition year under section 119B.011, subdivision 20, and must be moved into the basic sliding fee program as soon as possible after they complete their transition year.

Subd. 5. **Review of use of funds; reallocation.** (a) After each quarter, the commissioner shall review the use of basic sliding fee program allocations by county. The commissioner may reallocate unexpended or unencumbered money among those counties who have expended their full allocation or may allow a county to expend up to ten percent of its allocation in the subsequent allocation period.

(b) Any unexpended state and federal appropriations from the first year of the biennium may be carried forward to the second year of the biennium.

Subd. 6. **Allocation formula.** The basic sliding fee state and federal funds shall be allocated on a calendar year basis. Funds shall be allocated first in amounts equal to each county's guaranteed floor according to subdivision 8, with any remaining available funds allocated according to the following formula:

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(a) One-fourth of the funds shall be allocated in proportion to each county's total expenditures for the basic sliding fee child care program reported during the most recent fiscal year completed at the time of the notice of allocation.

(b) Up to one-fourth of the funds shall be allocated in proportion to the number of families participating in the transition year child care program as reported during and averaged over the most recent six months completed at the time of the notice of allocation. Funds in excess of the amount necessary to serve all families in this category shall be allocated according to paragraph (f).

(c) Up to one-fourth of the funds shall be allocated in proportion to the average of each county's most recent six months of reported first, second, and third priority waiting list as defined in subdivision 2 and the reinstatement list of those families whose assistance was terminated with the approval of the commissioner under Minnesota Rules, part 3400.0183, subpart 1. Funds in excess of the amount necessary to serve all families in this category shall be allocated according to paragraph (f).

(d) Up to one-fourth of the funds shall be allocated in proportion to the average of each county's most recent six months of reported waiting list as defined in subdivision 2 and the reinstatement list of those families whose assistance was terminated with the approval of the commissioner under Minnesota Rules, part 3400.0183, subpart 1. Funds in excess of the amount necessary to serve all families in this category shall be allocated according to paragraph (f).

(e) The amount necessary to serve all families in paragraphs (b), (c), and (d) shall be calculated based on the basic sliding fee average cost of care per family in the county with the highest cost in the most recently completed calendar year.

(f) Funds in excess of the amount necessary to serve all families in paragraphs (b), (c), and (d) shall be allocated in proportion to each county's total expenditures for the basic sliding fee child care program reported during the most recent fiscal year completed at the time of the notice of allocation.

Subd. 6a. **Allocation due to increased funding.** When funding increases are implemented within a calendar year, every county must receive an allocation at least equal to its original allocation for the same time period. The remainder of the allocation must be recalculated to reflect the funding increase, according to formulas identified in subdivision 6.

Subd. 6b. **Allocation due to decreased funding.** When funding decreases are implemented within a calendar year, county allocations must be reduced in an amount proportionate to the reduction in the total allocation for the same time period. This applies when a funding decrease necessitates the revision of an existing calendar year allocation.

Subd. 8. **Guaranteed floor.** (a) Beginning January 1, 1996, each county's guaranteed floor shall equal 90 percent of the allocation received in the preceding calendar year. For the period January 1, 1999, to December 31, 1999, each county's guaranteed floor must be equal to its original calendar year 1998 allocation or its actual earnings for calendar year 1998, whichever is less.

(b) When the amount of funds available for allocation is less than the amount available in the previous year, each county's previous year allocation shall be reduced in proportion to the reduction in the statewide funding, for the purpose of establishing the guaranteed floor.

#### **119B.05 MFIP CHILD CARE ASSISTANCE PROGRAM.**

Subdivision 1. **Eligible participants.** Families eligible for child care assistance under the MFIP child care program are:

(1) MFIP participants who are employed or in job search and meet the requirements of section 119B.10;

(2) persons who are members of transition year families under section 119B.011, subdivision 20, and meet the requirements of section 119B.10;

(3) families who are participating in employment orientation or job search, or other employment or training activities that are included in an approved employability development plan under section 256J.95;

(4) MFIP families who are participating in work job search, job support, employment, or training activities as required in their employment plan, or in appeals, hearings, assessments, or orientations according to chapter 256J;

(5) MFIP families who are participating in social services activities under chapter 256J as required in their employment plan approved according to chapter 256J;

(6) families who are participating in services or activities that are included in an approved family stabilization plan under section 256J.575;

(7) families who are participating in programs as required in tribal contracts under section 119B.02, subdivision 2, or 256.01, subdivision 2;

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(8) families who are participating in the transition year extension under section 119B.011, subdivision 20a; and

(9) student parents as defined under section 119B.011, subdivision 19b.

### **119B.07 USE OF MONEY.**

(a) Money for persons listed in sections 119B.03, subdivision 3, and 119B.05, subdivision 1, shall be used to reduce the costs of child care for students, including the costs of child care for students while employed if enrolled in an eligible education program at the same time and making satisfactory progress towards completion of the program. Counties may not limit the duration of child care subsidies for a person in an employment or educational program, except when the person is found to be ineligible under the child care fund eligibility standards. Any limitation must be based on a person's employment plan in the case of an MFIP participant, and county policies included in the child care fund plan. The maximum length of time a student is eligible for child care assistance under the child care fund for education and training is no more than the time necessary to complete the credit requirements for an associate or baccalaureate degree as determined by the educational institution, excluding basic or remedial education programs needed to prepare for postsecondary education or employment.

(b) To be eligible, the student must be in good standing and be making satisfactory progress toward the degree. Time limitations for child care assistance do not apply to basic or remedial educational programs needed to prepare for postsecondary education or employment. These programs include: high school, general equivalency diploma, and English as a second language. Programs exempt from this time limit must not run concurrently with a postsecondary program. If an MFIP participant who is receiving MFIP child care assistance under this chapter moves to another county, continues to participate in educational or training programs authorized in their employment plans, and continues to be eligible for MFIP child care assistance under this chapter, the MFIP participant must receive continued child care assistance from the county responsible for their current employment plan, under section 256G.07.

### **119B.09 FINANCIAL ELIGIBILITY.**

Subd. 3. **Priorities; allocations.** If a county projects that its child care allocation is insufficient to meet the needs of all eligible families, it may prioritize among the families that remain to be served after the county has complied with the priority requirements of section 119B.03. Counties that have established a priority for families who are not MFIP participants beyond those established under section 119B.03 must submit the policy in the annual child care fund plan.

Subd. 4a. **Temporary ineligibility of military personnel.** Counties must reserve a family's position under the child care assistance fund if a family has been receiving child care assistance but is temporarily ineligible for assistance due to increased income from active military service. Activated military personnel may be temporarily ineligible until deactivation. A county must reserve a military family's position on the basic sliding fee waiting list under the child care assistance fund if a family is approved to receive child care assistance and reaches the top of the waiting list but is temporarily ineligible for assistance.

### **119B.11 COUNTY CONTRIBUTION.**

Subd. 4. **Maintenance of funding effort.** To receive money through this program, each county shall certify, in its annual plan to the commissioner, that the county has not reduced allocations from other federal and state sources, which, in the absence of the child care fund, would have been available for child care assistance. However, the county must continue contributions, as necessary, to maintain on the basic sliding fee program, families who are receiving assistance on July 1, 1995, until the family loses eligibility for the program or until a family voluntarily withdraws from the program. This subdivision does not affect the local match required for this program under other sections of the law.

### **290.0671 MINNESOTA WORKING FAMILY CREDIT.**

Subd. 7. **Inflation adjustment.** The earned income amounts used to calculate the credit and the income thresholds at which the maximum credit begins to be reduced in subdivision 1 must be adjusted for inflation. The commissioner shall adjust by the percentage determined pursuant to the provisions of section 1(f) of the Internal Revenue Code, except that in section 1(f)(3)(B) the word "2013" shall be substituted for the word "1992." For 2015, the commissioner shall then

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determine the percent change from the 12 months ending on August 31, 2013, to the 12 months ending on August 31, 2014, and in each subsequent year, from the 12 months ending on August 31, 2013, to the 12 months ending on August 31 of the year preceding the taxable year. The earned income thresholds as adjusted for inflation must be rounded to the nearest \$10 amount. If the amount ends in \$5, the amount is rounded up to the nearest \$10 amount. The determination of the commissioner under this subdivision is not a rule under the Administrative Procedure Act.
