2	INTRODUCED BY E. LIESER

4	A JOINT RESOLUTION OF THE SENATE AND THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE STATE OF
5	MONTANA EMPHASIZING THE VALUE OF PUBLIC LANDS IN MONTANA TO THE STATE'S ECONOMY,
6	RECREATION, HERITAGE, AND QUALITY OF LIFE; AND OPPOSING ANY EFFORT TO CLAIM, TAKE OVER,
7	LITIGATE FOR, OR SELL OFF FEDERAL LANDS WITHIN THE STATE OF MONTANA.
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9	WHEREAS, Montana has some of the most beautiful landscapes on earth, including mountains, rivers,
10	forests, foothills, prairies, sagebrush steppes and badlands; and
11	WHEREAS, many of those stunning places are public lands owned by all Americans; and
12	WHEREAS, public land under the management of the U.S. Forest Service, the Bureau of Land
13	Management, and other federal agencies constitutes more than 28% of the land in Montana; and
14	WHEREAS, these federal lands in Montana are essential to the quality of life in Montana, providing public
15	recreational opportunity for hunting, fishing, hiking, snowmobiling, riding all-terrain vehicles, wildlife watching,
16	backpacking, skiing, cycling, sightseeing, and numerous other outdoor recreational activities; and
17	WHEREAS, these federal lands are also incredibly rich in wildlife; and
18	WHEREAS, Montanans of every economic class enjoy world-class hunting and angling opportunities,
19	including on these public lands; and
20	WHEREAS, outdoor recreation is a major economic driver in Montana, generating an estimated \$5.8
21	billion in economic activity and supporting more than 62,000 jobs in the state according to a study conducted by
22	the Outdoor Industry Association; and
23	WHEREAS, Montana business owners consistently cite the appeal of outdoor recreation as a major draw
24	to help recruit employees to new and existing businesses in our state, which is another way federal public lands
25	help drive our economy; and
26	WHEREAS, Montana's agriculture industry includes numerous ranchers who depend on grazing on public
27	land, including federal land, to sustain their operations; and
28	WHEREAS, Montana's timber industry is dependent on federal land for a part of its timber supply; and
29	WHEREAS, there is a broad consensus in Montana on the need for more effective management of our
30	forests in areas near communities and public infrastructure; and



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1	WHEREAS, Montanans are actively collaborating among diverse interests and with federal land
2	managers to move good forest management projects forward; and
3	WHEREAS, federal agencies that manage these lands employ hundreds of Montanans who pay taxes
4	and contribute to their communities; and
5	WHEREAS, Americans from throughout the country value these public lands as a part of our national
6	heritage; and
7	WHEREAS, Montana's forests are naturally prone to fire, including periodic large-scale fires, as part of
8	the ecosystem in which they have evolved over millennia, although a warming climate has accentuated the
9	process; and
10	WHEREAS, federal money to fund firefighting costs is essential to protecting communities and public
11	infrastructure, including municipal watersheds, particularly in dry years; and
12	WHEREAS, periodically severe wildland fire seasons can result in suppression costs in the tens of
13	millions of dollars in Montana alone; and
14	WHEREAS, in the event that Montana were to acquire federal lands, a severe fire season would be
15	difficult for Montana to pay for out of the state budget and would require large state tax increases; and
16	WHEREAS, a 2014 poll conducted by Colorado College found that Montanans are hunters and anglers
17	at some of the highest rates in the country; and
18	WHEREAS, that same poll showed that Montanans by more than 70% oppose efforts to dispose of
19	federal lands; and
20	WHEREAS, decades of declining funding to federal land management agencies has reduced their
21	capacity to meet their multiple use mission.

23	NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE SENATE AND THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE
24	STATE OF MONTANA:
25	That the Montana Legislature oppose any effort to claim, take over, litigate for, or sell off federal lands
26	within the State of Montana.
27	BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the Legislature strongly support federal land management in Montana
28	and the incredible value they bring to our state's economy, recreation, heritage, and quality of life.
