A BILL for an Act to amend and reenact section 15.1-01-01, subsection 8 of section 15.1-15-02, subsection 6 of section 15.1-19-10, section 15.1-21-12.1, section 15.1-27-03.1, subsection 4 of section 15.1-27-03.2, section 15.1-27-04.1, and subsection 5 of section 15.1-36-08 of the North Dakota Century Code, relating to the state board of public school education members, the definition of "probationary teacher", the definition of "weapon", modification of weighting factors and transition maximums, an increase in per student payments, and professional development for reading; to provide for a transfer; and to provide an effective date.

## 8 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATIVE ASSEMBLY OF NORTH DAKOTA:

- 9 **SECTION 1. AMENDMENT.** Section 15.1-01-01 of the North Dakota Century Code is amended and reenacted as follows:
- 11 15.1-01-01. State board of public school education Composition.
- 1. The state board of public school education consists of the superintendent of public instruction and:
  - a. An individual representing Barnes, Cass, Grand Forks, Griggs, Nelson, Steele, and Traill Counties legislative districts ten, eleven, thirteen, sixteen, twenty-one, forty-one, forty-four, and forty-six;
  - b. An individual representing Benson, Bottineau, Cavalier, McHenry, Pembina,
    Pierce, Ramsey, Renville, Rolette, Towner, and Walsh Countieslegislative districts
    nine, fifteen, seventeen, eighteen, nineteen, twenty, forty-two, and forty-three;
  - c. An individual representing <del>Dickey, Emmons, LaMoure, Logan, McIntosh, Ransom, Richland, and Sargent Counties</del>legislative districts twelve, twenty-two, twenty-four, twenty-five, twenty-seven, twenty-eight, twenty-nine, and forty-five;

- d. An individual representing Burleigh, Eddy, Foster, Kidder, McLean, Sheridan,
   Stutsman, and Wells Counties legislative districts seven, eight, thirty, thirty-one,
   thirty-two, thirty-four, thirty-five, and forty-seven;
  - e. An individual representing Burke, Divide, McKenzie, Mountrail, Ward, and Williams Counties legislative districts three, four, five, six, fourteen, thirty-three, thirty-eight, and forty; and
  - f. An individual representing Adams, Billings, Bowman, Dunn, Golden Valley, Grant, Hettinger, Mercer, Morton, Oliver, Sioux, Slope, and Stark Countieslegislative districts one, two, twenty-three, twenty-six, thirty-six, thirty-seven, and thirty-nine.
  - 2. All board members other than the superintendent of public instruction must be qualified electors and must reside in one of the counties districts they represent.
  - 3. The governor shall appoint new board members from a list of <a href="three">three</a> names submitted by a committee consisting of the president of North Dakota united or the president's <a href="designee">designee</a>, the president of the North Dakota council of educational leaders or the <a href="president's designee">president's designee</a>, and the president of the North Dakota school boards association or the president's designee. Two of the state board members must be members of the North Dakota school boards association. <a href="Two of the state board members must be">Two of the state board members must be</a> <a href="mailto:employed by a North Dakota school district and be active members of the North">Two of the State board members of the North</a> <a href="Dakota association">Dakota association of school administrators</a>.
  - 4. Appointees serve for six-year terms, staggered so that the terms of two members expire on June thirtieth of each even-numbered year.
  - 5. If a vacancy occurs, the governor shall appoint an individual to serve for the duration of the unexpired term.
  - 6. Each member of the board is entitled to receive, from the biennial appropriation for the superintendent of public instruction, compensation in the amount of sixty-two dollars and fifty cents per day and reimbursement for expenses, as provided by law for state officers, if the member is attending board meetings or performing duties directed by the board. The compensation provided for in this section may not be paid to any member who receives a salary or other compensation as an employee or official of this state if the individual is serving on the board by virtue of the individual's state office or state employment.

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1 The superintendent of public instruction shall serve as the executive director and 2 secretary of the board. The superintendent shall call meetings as necessary, carry out 3 the policies of the board, and employ personnel necessary to perform the board's 4 duties. 5 8. The board shall annually elect one member to serve as the chairman. 6 SECTION 2. AMENDMENT. Subsection 8 of section 15.1-15-02 of the North Dakota 7 Century Code is amended and reenacted as follows: 8 For purposes of this section, "probationary teacher" means an individual teaching for 9 less than two years in the school district. 10 SECTION 3. AMENDMENT. Subsection 6 of section 15.1-19-10 of the North Dakota 11 Century Code is amended and reenacted as follows: 12 For purposes of this section: 13 "Firearm" has the meaning provided in Public Law No. 90-351 [82 Stat. 197; 14 18 U.S.C. 921]. 15 b. "School property" includes all land within the perimeter of the school site and all 16 school buildings, structures, facilities, and school vehicles, whether owned or 17 leased by a school district, and the site of any school-sponsored event or activity. 18 "Weapon" includes any switchblade or gravity knife, machete, scimitar, stiletto, <u>C.</u> 19 sword, dagger, or knife with a blade of five inches [12.7 centimeters] or more; any 20 throwing star, nunchaku, or other martial arts weapon; any billy, blackjack, sap, 21 bludgeon, cudgel, metal knuckles, or sand club; any slungshot; any bow and 22 arrow, crossbow, or spear; any weapon that will expel, or is readily capable of 23 expelling, a projectile by the action of a spring, compressed air, or compressed 24 gas, including any such weapon, loaded or unloaded, commonly referred to as a 25 BB gun, air rifle, or CO2 gun; and any projector of a bomb or any object 26 containing or capable of producing and emitting any noxious liquid, gas, or 27 substance. The term does not include a spray or aerosol containing CS, also 28 known as ortho-chlorobenzamalonitrile; CN, also known as alpha-29 chloroacetophenone; or other irritating agent intended for use in the defense of

an individual, nor does the term include a device that uses voltage for the

defense of an individual, unless the device uses a projectile and voltage or the

1		device uses a projectile and may be used to apply multiple applications of voltage

  - 2. The superintendent of public instruction shall determine each school district's weighted average daily membership by adding the products derived under subsection 1 to the district's average daily membership.

**SECTION 6. AMENDMENT.** Subdivision o of subsection 1 of section 15.1-27-03.1 of the North Dakota Century Code is amended and reenacted as follows:

o. For districts paid based on September tenth enrollment in the prior year, 0.701.00 the number of students determined by deducting the number of students in the prior year's September tenth enrollment from the prior year's average daily membership, increasing the factor annually by 0.10, not to exceed 1.00. If the prior year's September tenth enrollment exceeds the prior year's average daily membership, then a deduction of 0.501.00 the number of excess students, increasing the factor annually by 0.10, not to exceed 1.00.

- SECTION 7. AMENDMENT. Subsection 4 of section 15.1-27-03.2 of the North Dakota
   Century Code is amended and reenacted as follows:
  - 4. The school district size weighting factor determined under this section and multiplied by a school district's weighted average daily membership equals the district's weighted student units. For the 2022-23 school year, for school districts that operate multiple-kindergarten through grade twelve buildings at least nineteen miles [30.58 kilometers] apart, or multiple buildings at least nineteen miles [30.58 kilometers] apart with no-replicated grades, the superintendent of public instruction shall determine the school-size weighting factor for each building separately. The superintendent of public instruction shall multiply the school size weighting factor for each building by the school district's weighted average daily membership to determine each building's weighted student units. The superintendent of public instruction shall combine the weighted student units of all buildings in the school district to determine the school district's weighted student units.

**SECTION 8. AMENDMENT.** Section 15.1-27-04.1 of the North Dakota Century Code is amended and reenacted as follows:

## 15.1-27-04.1. Baseline funding - Establishment - Determination of state aid. (Effective through June 30, 2025)

- To determine the amount of state aid payable to each district, the superintendent of public instruction shall establish each district's baseline funding. A district's baseline funding consists of:
  - All state aid received by the district in accordance with chapter 15.1-27 during the
     2018-19 school year;
  - An amount equal to the property tax deducted by the superintendent of public instruction to determine the 2018-19 state aid payment;
  - c. An amount equal to seventy-five percent of the revenue received by the school district during the 2017-18 school year for the following revenue types:
    - (1) Revenue reported under code 2000 of the North Dakota school district financial accounting and reporting manual, as developed by the superintendent of public instruction in accordance with section 15.1-02-08;

1 Mineral revenue received by the school district through direct allocation from (2) 2 the state treasurer and not reported under code 2000 of the North Dakota 3 school district financial accounting and reporting manual, as developed by 4 the superintendent of public instruction in accordance with section 5 15.1-02-08; 6 (3) Tuition reported under code 1300 of the North Dakota school district 7 financial accounting and reporting manual, as developed by the 8 superintendent of public instruction in accordance with section 15.1-02-08, 9 with the exception of revenue received specifically for the operation of an 10 educational program provided at a residential treatment facility, tuition 11 received for the provision of an adult farm management program, and 12 beginning in the 2021-22 school year, seventeen percent of tuition received 13 under an agreement to educate students from a school district on an 14 air force base with funding received through federal impact aid, and an 15 additional seventeen percent of tuition received under an agreement to 16 educate students from a school district on an air force base with funding 17 received through federal impact aid each school year thereafter, until the 18 2024-25 school year when sixty-eight percent of tuition received under an 19 agreement to educate students from a school district on an air force base 20 with funding received through federal impact aid must be excluded from the 21 tuition calculation under this paragraph; 22 Revenue from payments in lieu of taxes on the distribution and transmission (4) 23 of electric power; 24 (5) Revenue from payments in lieu of taxes on electricity generated from 25 sources other than coal; and 26 Revenue from the leasing of land acquired by the United States for which (6) 27 compensation is allocated to the state under 33 U.S.C. 701(c)(3); 28 An amount equal to the total revenue received by the school district during the d. 29 2017-18 school year for the following revenue types: 30 (1) Mobile home tax revenue; 31 (2) Telecommunications tax revenue; and

- 1 (3) Revenue from payments in lieu of taxes and state reimbursement of the homestead credit and disabled veterans credit; and
  - e. Beginning with the 2020-21 school year, the superintendent shall reduce the baseline funding for any school district that becomes an elementary district pursuant to section 15.1-07-27 after the 2012-13 school year. The reduction must be proportional to the number of weighted student units in the grades that are offered through another school district relative to the total number of weighted student units the school district offered in the year before the school district became an elementary district. The reduced baseline funding applies to the calculation of state aid for the first school year in which the school district becomes an elementary district and for each year thereafter. For districts that become an elementary district prior to the 2020-21 school year, the superintendent shall use the reduced baseline funding to calculate state aid for the 2020-21 school year and for each year thereafter.
  - a. The superintendent shall divide the district's baseline funding determined in subsection 1 by the district's 2017-18 weighted student units to determine the district's baseline funding per weighted student unit.
    - b. For any school district that becomes an elementary district pursuant to section 15.1-07-27 after the 2017-18 school year, the superintendent shall adjust the district's baseline funding per weighted student unit used to calculate state aid. The superintendent shall divide the district's baseline funding determined in subsection 1 by the district's weighted student units after the school district becomes an elementary district to determine the district's adjusted baseline funding per weighted student unit. The superintendent shall use the district's adjusted baseline funding per weighted student unit in the calculation of state aid for the first school year in which the school district becomes an elementary district and for each year thereafter.
    - c. Beginning with the 2021-22 school year and for each school year thereafter, the superintendent shall reduce the district's baseline funding per weighted student unit. Each year the superintendent shall calculate the amount by which the district's baseline funding per weighted student unit exceeds the payment per

The transition maximum is determined by multiplying the 22 transition maximum rate, which may not exceed the rate under paragraph 1 23 of subdivision b of this subsection, by the district's weighted student units-24 from the previous school year. 25 For the 2024-25 school year, the transition maximum rate is one hundred 26 ten percent of the district's baseline funding per weighted student unit, as-27 established in subsection 2, plus forty percent of the difference between the 28 rate under paragraph 1 of subdivision b of this subsection and one hundred 29 ten percent of the district's baseline funding per weighted student unit. The 30 transition maximum is determined by multiplying the transition maximum

rate, which may not exceed the rate under paragraph 1 of subdivision b of

1 this subsection, by the district's weighted student units from the previous 2 school year. 3 (5) For the 2025-26 school year, the transition maximum rate is one hundred 4 ten percent of the district's baseline funding per weighted student unit, as-5 established in subsection 2, plus sixty percent of the difference between the 6 rate under paragraph 1 of subdivision b of this subsection and one hundred 7 ten percent of the district's baseline funding per weighted student unit. The 8 transition maximum is determined by multiplying the transition maximum 9 rate, which may not exceed the rate under paragraph 1 of subdivision b of 10 this subsection, by the district's weighted student units from the previous-11 school year. 12 (6) For the 2026-27 school year, the transition maximum rate is one hundred 13 ten percent of the district's baseline funding per weighted student unit, as-14 established in subsection 2, plus eighty percent of the difference between 15 the rate under paragraph 1 of subdivision b of this subsection and 16 one hundred ten percent of the district's baseline funding per weighted 17 student unit.
