53B-8c-103, as last amended by Laws of Utah 1998, Chapter 282
Be it enacted by the Legislature of the state of Utah:
Section 1. Section <b>53B-8c-102</b> is amended to read:
53B-8c-102. Definitions.
As used in this chapter:
(1) "Child" means an individual who:
(a) is a natural or adopted child of a deceased peace officer or deceased firefighter; an
(b) was under the age of 25 at the time of the peace officer's or firefighter's death.
(2) "Department" means the Department of Public Safety.
(3) "Fees" means charges, in addition to tuition, that are:
(a) imposed by a state institution of higher education; and
(b) required to be paid by a student to enroll in the state institution of higher education
or engage in a course of study at the state institution of higher education.
[(3)] (4) "Killed" means that the peace officer's or firefighter's death is the direct and
proximate result of a traumatic injury incurred in the line of duty.
[(4)] (5) "Line of duty" means an action that a peace officer or firefighter is obligated
or authorized to perform by rule, regulation, condition of employment or service, or law,
including a social, ceremonial, or athletic function that the peace officer or firefighter is
assigned to or compensated for by the public agency being served.
[(5)] (6) "Occupational disease" means a disease that routinely constitutes a special
hazard in, or is commonly regarded as concomitant of, the peace officer's or firefighter's
occupation.
[(6)] (7) "State institution of higher education" means those institutions designated in
Section 53B-1-102.
[(7)] (8) "Traumatic injury" means a wound or the condition of the body caused by
external force, including an injury inflicted by bullet, explosive, sharp instrument, blunt object
or other physical blow, fire, smoke, chemical, electricity, climatic condition, infectious diseas
radiation, or bacteria, but excluding an occupational disease.
[(8)] (9) "Tuition" means tuition and fees at the rate charged for residents of the state.
[(9)] (10) (a) "Utah firefighter" or "firefighter" means a member, including volunteer

68	53B-8c-103. Tuition waivers for surviving spouses and children of police officers
69	and firefighters killed in the line of duty Qualifications Limitations.
70	(1) Beginning in the 1997-98 academic year, and subject to the limitations in
71	Subsections (2), (3), and (4) of this section, a state institution of higher education shall waive
72	tuition for each child and surviving spouse of a Utah peace officer or Utah firefighter who has
73	been killed or is killed in the line of duty if the individual meets the following requirements:
74	(a) applies, qualifies, and is admitted as a full-time, part-time, or summer school
75	student in a program of study leading to a degree or certificate;
76	(b) is a resident student of the state as determined under Section 53B-8-102;
77	(c) applies to the department for a waiver of tuition under this chapter and provides
78	evidence satisfactory to the department that:
79	(i) the applicant is the surviving spouse or child of a peace officer or firefighter who
80	was killed in the line of duty;
81	(ii) the course or courses for which the applicant is seeking a tuition waiver meet the
82	requirements of Subsection (2); and

[(e) is certified by the financial aid officer at the higher education institution as needing the tuition waiver in order to meet recognized educational expenses, with the understanding

Subsection (1)(c) for the first time before the age of 25;

- that if the applicant's family income, excluding any income from death benefits attributable to the peace officer's or firefighter's death, is below 400% of the poverty level under federal poverty guidelines, income from any death benefits accruing to the applicant as a result of the death may not be counted as family income in determining financial need under this Subsection (1)(e);
- [(f)] (e) maintains satisfactory academic progress, as defined by the institution of higher education, for each term or semester in which the individual is enrolled, which may be measured by the definition used for federal student assistance programs under Title IV of the Higher Education Act of 1965; and
- [(g)] (f) has not achieved a bachelor's degree and has received tuition reimbursement under this chapter for less than 124 semester credits or 180 quarter credits at an institution of higher education.
- (2) A child or surviving spouse of a peace officer or firefighter who was killed in the line of duty is eligible for a tuition waiver under this section of not more than nine semesters or the equivalent number of quarters.
- (3) Tuition shall be waived only to the extent that the tuition is not covered or paid by any scholarship, trust fund, statutory benefit, or any other source of tuition coverage available for a waiver under this chapter.
- (4) An institution of higher education shall waive tuition under this chapter only for courses that are applicable toward the degree or certificate requirements of the program in which the child or surviving spouse is enrolled.
