A BILL

for

1 AN ACT relating to elections; authorizing the use of 2 electronic pollbooks; authorizing the use of vote centers; 3 establishing a procedure for changing polling locations; 4 providing definitions; making conforming amendments; 5 repealing certification of pollbooks by election judges; 6 and providing for an effective date.

8 Be It Enacted by the Legislature of the State of Wyoming: 9

Section 1. 3	for casting and counting votes;

6	location where voters cast their ballots on election day;

8	(xlix) "Vote center" means a polling place at
9	which any registered elector in the political subdivision
10	holding the election may vote, regardless of the precinct
11	in which he resides, connected through secure internet
12	connections to provide voting information to and receive
13	voting information from the electronic pollbook maintained
14	by the county clerk and used as an option to traditional
15	polling places at the discretion of the county clerk;

17	(xlx) "Overvote" means a vote placed on a ballot
18	question in excess of the allowable votes for that ballot
19	question;

21	(xlxi) "Undervote" means a vote that could have
22	been made on a ballot question but which was not made on
23	that ballot question.

The notice shall include 11 the date and place of the county commissioners' meeting 12 where the proposed change will be discussed. The county 13 clerk shall mail by certified mail return receipt requested 14 a copy of the published notice to the county chairman of 15 each political party in the county not later than fifteen 16 (15) days before the meeting. A proposed change in the location of a polling place may be adopted by the county 17 clerk at a meeting of the county commissioners during which 18 19 the proposed change is discussed.

When all ballots are cast, the machine 6 shall be locked against further voting and sealed as 7 prescribed by law. Pollbooks within a precinct shall first 8 9 be made to agree before any votes are counted. When the 10 pollbooks agree, Election judges shall commence to count votes and shall continue without adjournment until counting 11 12 is completed. 13 14 22-14-105. Vote tallying in voting machine polling 15 places. 16 17 (a) In voting machine precincts polling places, the judges of election shall cast all remaining absentee 18 19 ballots on a voting machine in the manner prescribed by 20 W.S. 22-9-121 and shall lock and seal the voting machines. 21 They shall certify in writing that the machine was locked 22 and sealed, stating the time, the number of voters voting 23 on each machine in the precinct as shown on the public

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counters, the number on the seal, and the number registered

17 (a) As soon as possible after the tabulation of votes 18 is complete, election judges shall return by messenger to 19 the clerk who prepared the ballots for the election the 20 following records and returns in a sealed packet:

1 (i) One (1) copy of the sealed pollbook with one 2 (1) sealed copy from each electronic voting system printer 3 pack; 4 5 (viii) Oaths of judges of election; 6 7 (ix) Reconciliation of ballots; 8 9 (x) Tally sheet if ballots are hand counted. 10 22-15-109. Poll watchers; certification; 11 12 qualification; authority; removal. 13 (a) The county chairman of each political party may 14 15 certify poll watchers prior to the day of the election to 16 serve in each precinct polling place. Not more than one 17 (1) poll watcher from each political party may serve simultaneously unless the chief judge determines that one 18 19 (1) additional poll watcher from each political party may 20 be accommodated in the polling premises place without 21 disrupting the polling process.

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1	(b) A poll watcher shall belong to the political
2	party he represents and shall be a registered elector
3	residing in the county. A poll watcher shall serve only at
4	the precinct polling place designated on the certificate.
5	A poll watcher is authorized to observe voter turn out and
6	registration and may make written memoranda but shall not
7	challenge voters, conduct electioneering activities or
8	disrupt the polling process.

10	(c) The chief judge may remove a poll watcher from
11	the polling premises place for disturbing the polling
12	place, or for any other violation of the Election Code.

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Any qualified elector in the political subdivision shall be 1 2 entitled to vote on the bond question in person or by 3 absentee ballot, in for the precinct in which he is 4 registered, as provided by law. 5 6 22-21-201. State bond elections. 7 8 (c) Precincts may be consolidated for the purpose of any special election held under this section at the 9 10 discretion of the county clerk. Three (3) judges shall be appointed for the polling place in each precinct in such 11 12 special elections, and additional judges may be appointed 13 if deemed necessary by the county clerk. 14 15 22-22-102. Date of election of trustees; terms; 16 interim vacancies. 17 (a) The election of members of the board of trustees 18 19 of each school district and community college district 20 shall be held at the regular polling places in for each 21 district on the Tuesday next following the first Monday in November in general election years. Terms of office shall 22

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run for four (4) years beginning at 12:00 noon on the first 1 2 day in December following the election. 3 4 22-23-201. Conduct; who may vote. 5 (a) Except as provided in W.S. 22-23-202 municipal 6 primary and general elections are held at the same time, in 7 8 the same manner, at the same polling places, and are 9 conducted by the same precinct election officials, using 10 the same poll lists, as the statewide primary and general 11 elections. 12 13 22-23-804. Ballots. 14 15 The municipal clerk shall provide ballots for the special 16 election and shall deliver to each precinct polling place ballots equal in number to the number of electors 17 registered in the precinct plus twenty-five percent (25%). 18 19 20 22-23-805. Poll lists. 21 Precinct poll lists for the special election shall be 22 23 obtained by the municipal clerk from the county clerk and

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1	shall be paid for by the municipality. The municipal clerk
2	shall furnish copies of the precinct poll lists to the
3	judges of election. A copy of the precinct registry list
4	shall be posted at each precinct polling place during the
5	special election.
